# **OVERVIEW OF COORDINATED PROGRAM REVIEW PROCEDURES**

As one part of its Accountability System, the Department of Education oversees local compliance with education requirements through the Coordinated Program Review System (CPR). All reviews include the following selected requirements:

- special education under the federal Individuals with Disabilities Education Act (IDEA-2004), and M.G.L. Chapter 71B (Chapter 766 of the Acts of 1972). Note that until regulations under IDEA-2004 are final, the Department has the responsibility of enforcing regulations under IDEA-1997 that do not conflict with IDEA-2004; therefore both IDEA-1997 regulations and sections of IDEA-2004 are cited in the special education standards.
- federal civil rights requirements under Title VI of the Civil Rights Act of 1964, the Equal Educational Opportunities Act of 1974, Title IX of the Education Amendments of 1972, Section 504 of the Rehabilitation Act of 1973, and Title II of the Americans with Disabilities Act of 1990, together with related state requirements under M.G.L. Chapter 76, Section 5 (Chapter 622 of the Acts of 1971) and other Massachusetts General Laws.
- targeted standards from the Board of Education's Physical Restraint regulations (603 CMR 46.00).
- targeted standards from the Board of Education's Student Learning Time regulations (603 CMR 27.00).
- targeted standards from the federal McKinney-Vento Homeless Education Assistance Improvements Act of 2001 (included in the No Child Left Behind Act of 2001).
- provisions of M.G.L. c. 71A, the state law that governs the provision of education to limited English proficient students. Note that due to the voters' approval in 2002 of an initiative petition entitled "Question 2," M.G.L. c. 71A has been significantly amended. Under the amended Chapter 71A, limited English proficient students, now referred to as "English learners," must be provided instruction in sheltered English immersion or two-way bilingual programs unless they have received a waiver. As a result of this change in the law, the Department's Coordinated Program Review standards under Chapter 71A were significantly revised for the 2003-2004 school year. All districts that enroll limited English proficient students will be reviewed using these updated standards during the 2005-2006 school year.

Additional program areas reviewed during the Coordinated Program Review visits in selected districts may include:

- Title I of the Elementary and Secondary Education Act of 1965, including other related grants funded by the No Child Left Behind Act of 2001;
- Safe and Drug-Free Schools and Communities Act;
- Career and Technical Education requirements under the federal Perkins Vocational and Technical Education Act and M.G.L. c. 74;
- Innovative assistance programs funded under Title V of the No Child Left Behind Act; and
- Nutrition Programs and Services.

# **Coordinated Program Review Elements**

- **Team:** Depending upon the size of a school district and the number of program areas to be reviewed, a team of two to eight Department staff members, together with any necessary outside consultants, conducts a Coordinated Program Review over two to ten days in a school district or charter school.
- **Scope:** Each school district and charter school in the Commonwealth is scheduled to receive a Coordinated Program Review every six years and a mid-cycle special education follow-up visit three years after the Coordinated Program Review; about seventy school districts and charter schools are scheduled for Coordinated Program Reviews in 2005-2006.
- **Content:** The Program Review criteria encompass the required elements for the specific program areas. In the case of special education, the elements selected for the 2005-2006 reviews contain, at a minimum, those required by the federal Office for Special Education Programs (OSEP) and revised requirements included under IDEA-2004 as described in the Department's Special Education Advisories. Additionally, the 2005-2006 reviews incorporate state special education requirements as adopted by the Board of Education and effective on July 1, 2005. The Program Review compliance criteria selected in all of the regulated program areas are those that are most closely aligned with the goals of the Massachusetts Education Reform Act of 1993 and intended to promote high standards and achievement for all students.
- **<u>Report:</u>** The Department's report is based on a review of written documentation and data regarding the operation of the district's programs, together with information gathered through the following Department program review methods:
  - Interviews of administrative, instructional, and support staff across all grade levels.
  - Interviews of parent advisory council (PAC) representatives and other interviews as requested by persons from the general public.
  - Student record reviews in the program areas of special education, English learner education (c. 71A), Career and Technical Education, and Section 504 (student accommodation plans). A representative sample of student records is selected by the Department. Student records are examined by the onsite team using standard Department student record review procedures to make determinations regarding the implementation of procedural and programmatic requirements. Parents of students with disabilities whose files are selected for the record review, as well as the parents of an equal number of other students with disabilities, are sent a survey that solicits information regarding their experiences with the district's implementation of special education programs, related services and procedural requirements; parents of students with limited English proficiency whose files are selected for the record review are sent a survey of their

experiences with the district's implementation of the English learner education program and related procedural requirements.

• Classroom and facilities observation. The onsite team visits a sample of instructional classrooms and other school facilities used in the delivery of programs and services to determine general levels of compliance with program requirements.

*Collaborative programs and services.* Where the district is a member of a collaborative approved by the Department of Education and is a site for programs or services operated by the collaborative, interviews, student record review, and classroom and facility observations are conducted for the collaborative.

*Ratings*. The onsite team gives a rating for each compliance criterion it reviews; those ratings are "Commendable," "Implemented" (meaning at least substantially implemented), "Implementation in Progress," "Partially Implemented," "Not Implemented" (meaning at least substantially not implemented), and "Not Applicable." "Implementation in Progress" is used for criteria containing new legal requirements and means that the district has implemented any old requirements contained in the criterion and is either training staff or beginning to implement the new requirements in such a way that the onsite team anticipates that the new requirements will be implemented by the end of the school year.

*Findings.* The onsite team includes a finding for each criterion that it rates "Commendable," "Partially Implemented," or "Not Implemented," explaining the basis for the rating. It may also include findings for other criteria.

*Executive Summary*. Organized by the report components described on the next page, the Executive Summary summarizes the report's major findings for each program reviewed

**Response:** Where criteria are not implemented fully, the local district or charter school must propose corrective actions to bring those areas into compliance with the respective statutes or regulations. These corrective actions are subject to the Department's review and approval. School districts and charter schools must demonstrate effective resolution of noncompliance identified by the Department as soon as possible but in no case later than one year from the issuance of the Department's Final Program Review Report.

The Department believes that the Coordinated Program Review process is a positive experience and that the Final Report is a helpful planning document for the continued development and improvement of programs and services in each school district, charter school, and educational collaborative.

#### **REPORT INTRODUCTION**

A six-member Massachusetts Department of Education team visited Middleborough Public Schools during the week of February 13, 2006 to evaluate the implementation of selected criteria in the program areas of special education, civil rights and other related general education requirements, English learner education, Title I and safe and drug free schools. The team appreciated the opportunity to interview staff and parents, to observe classroom facilities and to review the programs underway in the district. The onsite team would like to commend the following areas that were brought to its attention and that it believes have a significant and positive impact on the delivery of educational services for students enrolled in the Middleborough Public Schools. These areas are as follows:

The district does a very good job transitioning students into their preschool and kindergarten programs and transitioning them from their high school program to adult life. The district works closely with the early intervention agencies, effectively evaluating young children and arranging for services and programs as required. As part of their orientation, parents and children in the preschool program ride the bus route. The kindergarten screening process is organized to effectively screen the students and prepare parents for their child's transition to school. The high school language development program provides a wide range of work opportunities and vocational training for disabled students. High school staff members take part in the Local Resource Management Team where they meet monthly with representatives of adult agencies to resolve obstacles that arise in a student's work, community, school, or agency environment.

The district is commended for the inclusive atmosphere observed in all schools. There were opportunities for the most disabled students to be part of the life of the school. Examples were sited of many special education students taking part in sports or extra curricular activities. High school students show strong support of Special Olympics as they hold a rally for the athletes who will take part. Deaf and hard of hearing students who are part of the READS Collaborative are given many opportunities to be included in regular education classes with the support of sign language interpreters. Students from collaborative classes were observed throughout their schools actively interacting with their peers. The district is committed to educating students in the least restrictive setting; across all grade levels there are inclusion classes taught by teams of regular and special education teachers.

The administrative staff is commended for the open communication and support given to staff members. The administrator of special education has established an organized system of procedures to ensure that the regulatory requirements of special education are monitored. All special education staff members as well as principals, assistant principals, guidance counselors, and curriculum coordinators have copies of the district's comprehensive policy and procedure manual for special education. The administrator of special education and team chairpersons work together to ensure that special education staff members receive the training that they need. Assessments are extensive and comprehensive, IEPs are closely monitored, and timelines are tracked.

The district is commended for the range of professional development opportunities that are offered to staff members. Surveys are used to identify professional development needs and para professional staff members are now included in the training that takes place on professional and early release days.

Some of the commendations noted above are repeated within the body of the Department's report under the appropriate compliance criteria.

The Department is submitting the following Coordinated Program Review Report containing findings made pursuant to this onsite visit. In preparing this report, the team reviewed extensive written

- 27 interviews of administrative staff.
- 53 interviews of teaching and support services staff across all levels.
- 1 interview of a parent advisory council (PAC) representative.
- 18 interviews of students
- Student record reviews: A sample of 25 special education and three English language learner student records was selected by the Department. Student records were first examined by local staff, whose findings were then verified by the onsite team using standard Department of Education student record review procedures to make determinations regarding the implementation of procedural and programmatic requirements.
- Parent surveys: 50 parents of students with disabilities were sent surveys that solicited information regarding their experiences with the district's implementation of special education programs, related services and procedural requirements. Twenty-one of these parent surveys were returned to the Department of Education for review by the onsite team.
- Observation of classrooms and other facilities. A sample of 25 instructional classrooms and other school facilities used in the delivery of programs and services was visited to determine general levels of compliance with program requirements.

The report includes findings in the program areas reviewed organized under nine components. These components are listed in the executive summary on the following pages. The findings in each program area explain the "ratings, "determinations by the team about the implementation status of the criteria reviewed. The ratings indicate those criteria that were found by the team to be substantially "Implemented" or implemented in a "Commendable" manner. (Refer to the "Definition of Terms" section of the report.) Where criteria were found to be either "Partially Implemented" or "Not Implemented," the district or charter school must propose to the Department corrective actions to bring those areas into compliance with the controlling statute or regulation. In some instances the team may have rated a requirement as "Implemented" but made a specific comment on the district's implementation methods that also may require response from the district or charter school.

Districts are expected to incorporate the corrective action into their district and school improvement plans, including their professional development plans.

## EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

#### **Middleborough Public Schools**

The following summary organized under each of the nine overarching Coordinated Program Review components synthesizes the findings for criteria included in the Coordinated Program Review as they respond to essential questions that the Department has formulated for each of the components of the report. Note that a more detailed discussion of the onsite team's findings, together with the specific legal standards for each program area included in this review, follows this summary.

#### **Component I: Assessment of Students**

Has the district implemented an assessment system that uses appropriate instruments, is conducted according to the specified timelines, and covers the appropriate content areas to determine instructional needs of students?

The district has a wide range of student assessment instruments that are comprehensive and are completed by qualified individuals. Assessments are completed within thirty school days of receipt of the parent consent and the results of the evaluation are available for parents two days prior to the Team meeting. Progress reports are issued with required frequency, they contain specific information regarding the progress on IEPs goals, and they indicate if the student is likely to achieve the goal by the end of the IEP period. The district is commended for the supports that are in place to help a student transition from high school to adult life, but they need to consistently document in the IEP the age of majority discussion that takes place the year prior to a student's eighteenth birthday. Procedures are in place to track the timeline requirements for three-year reevaluations and annual IEP meetings. When a student does not need special education services or when services are terminated, procedures are not in place to follow the student and to provide adequate support in regular education.

Staff members have been trained to assess the English proficiency of limited English proficient students (LEP) and LEP students take part in Massachusetts Comprehensive Assessment System.

The Middleboro school district implements an effective assessment system for the Title I program. The Title I education specialists use a variety of formal assessments in the content area of reading as well as input from teacher recommendations to determine the instructional needs of eligible Title I students. Student performance is assessed in word skills, dictation of sentences and phonemic awareness. The developmental reading assessment, GRADE testing in grades k-3, Stanford 10 and MCAS are also utilized to determine the specific needs of each individual student.

#### **Component II: Student Identification and Program Placement**

Has the district followed procedures for student identification and placement into the program according to the criteria specified in law and/or regulations?

The district has wide outreach procedures in place to identify a student who may be in need of special education. They work with agencies providing early intervention services and have

Massachusetts Department of Education – Program Quality Assurance Services Middleborough Public Schools Coordinated Program Review Report –June 14, 2006 Page 8 of 138 commendable procedures in place to screen students for kindergarten or those who may be in need of preschool services. The district is commended for providing supports to educate students in the least restrictive setting and for promoting an accepting atmosphere that allows all students to be part of the life of the school. IEPs are detailed and written in generally understandable language, however, not all IEP goals were measurable. In an effort to obtain additional information regarding a student's areas of suspected disability, the district does not always issue a consent to evaluate or notice of their refusal to act within five days of the receipt of a parental request for an evaluation.

The district has completed a home survey to identify students who may be LEP and they have staff trained in assessing students' English proficiency. The district, however, does not have staff members trained in sheltered English instruction. Polices and procures need to be developed regarding granting waivers and exiting students from the ELE program.

The Title I program follows appropriate procedures for the identification and placement into the Title I targeted assistance program. Students in the fourth grade receive Title I services during social studies. The district might want to review their policies of removing students from the classroom during regular academic instructional hours.

# **Component III: Parental Involvement**

Has the district ensured that parents are notified in the appropriate language and are involved in decisions regarding their children's programs and services? Where appropriate, does the district involve community representatives in shaping programs?

The district makes every effort to ensure that parents are able to take part in Team meetings. The district takes the appropriate steps to communicate with parents who are deaf or hard of hearing, but procedures are needed to provide information to parents whose primary language is not English. Parent consent is obtained at all required junctures, but rejected IEPs are not always sent to the Bureau of Special Education Appeals within five days as required. The district supports an active parent advisory council for special education. The council, however, has not been involved in the planning, development and evaluation of the special education programs. The district communicates with community representatives when appropriate and has effectively involved the community in the shaping of vocational programs at the high school.

The district conducts timely and meaningful consultation with community agencies, parents, students, police and fire departments, Board of Health, District Attorney's Office, staff, counselors, administrators, nurses and religious leaders in the development and implementation of the Safe and Drug Free School (SDFS) programs and activities. There is evidence that the district promotes parent involvement and some of the parents participated in focus groups/ meetings regarding the prevalence of drugs and violence among youth in the community. The majority of parents were not aware of the goals and objectives, status reports, program outcomes and accomplishments of the SDFS program even though information is disseminated via the Tuesday Folders, web site and Ed-connect.

The Title I program provides information and resources for parents. The Take Home Program, Title I Parent Breakfast, literacy workshops and materials distributed to parents enhance the ability the parents have to help their children to achieve.

#### **Component IV: Curriculum and Instruction**

Does the district hold all students to high expectations and standards? Are programs designed to maximize student performance and students' participation in the general curriculum? Is curriculum throughout the district's programs based on the Massachusetts Curriculum Frameworks? Has the district provided for coordination across program areas?

All students are held to high expectations and all receive instruction based on Massachusetts Curriculum Frameworks. There is a wide range of services provided to students with disabilities and a range of alternative placements to meet their needs. Some teachers recommended the addition of pull-out services at the elementary or middle school levels to meet the needs of all students. There is a wide range of assistive technology devices and they are provided as recommended by the Team. Class sizes meet requirements but there is one class that required an age span waiver.

The district ensures that all students receive the required hours of structured learning. They ensure that extracurricular activities are accessible and they provide notice that they do not discriminate. Most student handbooks contained all required elements, but, notification regarding the contact person for grievances needs to be updated.

The SDFS coordinator provides coordination with all Program Directors/Coordinators, Administrators and others members of the community to address specific needs in the development and implementation of all programs and activities for students, staff and parents.

Title I students are held to the same high expectations and standards as all other students. The Title I staff provide instruction based on the Massachusetts Curriculum Standards as well as the Middleborough school district's curriculum. The staff designs materials that are supplemental and coordinate the planning with regular education classroom teachers in the delivery of instruction.

#### **Component V: Student Support Services**

Has the district ensured that all students have equal access to programs and services? Does the district provide support to students who need it?

The district ensures that all students have equal access to all educational and nonacademic programs and they ensure non-discriminatory administration of scholarships and awards. They make special efforts to involve all students in extracurricular activities and hold a pep rally to show enthusiastic support to students who will take part in Special Olympics. Deaf and hard of hearing students have access to counseling services and there is an American Sign Language Club at the middle school. The needs of students whose behavior affects their learning are addressed and procedures are in place to ensure compliance with the requirements when disciplining students with disabilities and those not yet found eligible for special education.

The Title I program is challenged with limited resources. Title I services at grades 3, 4, and 5 are delivered once a week for a forty-five minute time block. The program services a large number of students and is able to ensure access to the program, but with a potential reduction in staff, there is an immediate risk that some students may not be served.

# **Component VI: Faculty, Staff and Administration**

Does the district maintain certified staff in the specific program areas, provide supervision of aides and tutors, and provide ongoing professional development? Are program leadership and oversight effective? Are the district's personnel procedures non-discriminatory and does it seek to recruit employees from all groups?

The district maintains certified staff members in most program areas, but there are teachers whose license is not consistent with the grades of the students that they teach. Para professional staff members work in close supervision of licensed staff members and they have access to in-service and professional development opportunities. The district offers a wide range of professional development opportunities for all staff members. There is a need for additional training for regular education staff on state and federal special education requirements and related local special education policies, but staff members have received the required training in civil rights and confidentiality of student records. Although training has been provided in the past, a need for additional training on the co-teaching model was an identified need.

The Title 1 staff is made up of dedicated and highly qualified professionals. The staff works well with the regular classroom teaches and administrators. They provide support and expertise in literacy and whole class instruction sessions. Although these whole class sessions are valuable, they reduce the direct Title I services that can be provided.

#### **Component VII: School Facilities**

Does the district maintain accessible facilities that are conducive to learning, facilitate integration, and provide equal opportunity for students to achieve?

All programs are accessible, but the district is struggling to find adequate space for all programs and services in some schools. All students have instructional spaces that minimize separation from other students; however, there is a classroom at the Mary Goode School that was noted to be small for the number of students and staff members working in the classroom.

Title I students receive instruction in an environment that is accessible and conducive to learning.

# **Component VIII: Program Plan and Evaluation**

Does the district evaluate its programs in accordance with statutory and regulatory requirements? Does it use the results of its evaluations to improve programs? Do parents have opportunities for input on program needs, program implementation, and program evaluation and improvement?

The effectiveness of special education programs and services are regularly evaluated, but the district does not annually evaluate all aspects of its program to ensure that they do not limit access.

Currently there is not an evaluation plan in place for SDFS programs that includes process, outcome and impact assessment. Limited evaluations are done in class or at schools at the elementary level and information is not fully utilized for determining progress towards achieving district goals and objectives. Second Step curriculum is not implemented with fidelity at all elementary schools. Evaluation results are not currently made available to the

public.

The Title I staff and administrators meet regularly. Regular education classroom teachers and Title I staff meet to review and evaluate student performance. The Title I program needs assessment must be further developed to include an analysis of data as well as input from staff and parents. The written evaluation of the Title I program should include the results of the data analysis and the input from parents, instructional staff and administrators.

# **Component IX: Record keeping**

Does the district maintain required records and documentation for each program area? Are entitlement grants appropriately designed, amended, and locally monitored? Does the district use federal grant funds in accordance with statutory fund-use rules, including "supplement not supplant" provisions where applicable? Does the district meet applicable maintenance of effort requirements?

The district maintains records and documentation for special education as required.

Appropriate accounting documentation was found, budget procedures are in place and approved budgets and amendments are on file for fiscal years 2005 and 2006 for the SDFS programs. Expenditures are strictly related to the intent of the grant. Time distribution logs are maintained for individuals funded under Title IV. Middleborough conveys a clear message that acts of violence and illegal drug use are wrong and harmful. Sets of assurances, school discipline policies, security procedures and crisis management plan all include the required information for keeping schools safe and drug free.

The district Title I program maintains all required records and documents. The grant is appropriately administered and all grant funded activities are in accordance with Title I requirements.

# **READS Collaborative:**

READS Collaborative has 40 students in Middleborough schools in programs for the deaf and hard of hearing. The team met with the director of the program, a teacher and interpreter and two student records were reviewed. Four classrooms were visited from the pre-kindergarten to grade four. Each class in the collaborative program has a qualified teacher and at least one teacher aide. There is an early intervention component as meetings are held each week to provide support for parents and children under age three as well as parents of students in the preschool. Children are included in regular education programs beginning with art and physical education at the kindergarten level. It was clear that students in the collaborative program become part of the community of their classrooms and are included in all aspects of the life of the school.

# **READS** Academy in

Middleborough provides special educational programming and assessments. The team met with the director of the program, toured the school and examined three student records. The record review indicated that each student had a current, signed IEP and progress reports that noted progress on IEPs goals and indicated if the progress was sufficient for the student to achieve the goal by the end of the year. Each class had 8-10 students with a teacher, teacher aide and school adjustment counselor. Most students were observed to be actively engaged in learning; however, it was noted that one class was not on task as they were outside when scheduled to be in their history class. The assessment program is commended in that the staff

individually determine the time needed to complete each student's evaluation and they do not arbitrarily keep a student for the allowed 45 days. The average stay in the assessment class is 25 days.

When a student does not need direct special education services, the district does not always provide appropriate supports through regular education. The documentation review and interviews indicated that evaluation procedures do not ensure that the district responds within five school days to a request for an evaluation by issuing the consent for the evaluation or the N2 informing the parent why the district does not intend to act on the request. With the procedure that is in place, a principal would respond to a request for an evaluation within five school days by issuing a letter requesting information about the suspected disability. Regulations require that this information be obtained within five days so that the consent could be issued within the required time line.

The record review indicated that in most cases notice forms were completed with required detail when proposing an IEP; however, page 2 of the N1 form was often left blank when proposing an evaluation.

The eight-digit DOE Code following the school or district name is assigned by the Massachusetts Department of Education to every organization listed in the Directory Profiles, including every district and school in the Commonwealth. For districts and schools, the first four digits represent the District Code and the last four digits represent the School Code. Thus the DOE code "02660505" stands for "0266" (Sharon Public Schools) + "0505" (Sharon High).

Prior to the 2001 school year, DOE codes contained six digits (three for the district and three for the school.) With the exception of some special needs schools, the eight-digit codes are the same as the six-digit codes with one zero added before the district code and another zero added before the school code. Thus, Sharon High's old six-digit DOE code was 266505.

#### • Charter School Type:

It has the freedom to organize around a core mission, curriculum, theme, and/or teaching method and to control its own budget and hire (and fire) teachers and staff. In return for this freedom, a charter school must attract students and produce positive results within five years or its charter will not be renewed.

**Horace Mann**- Operates under the same set of rules as described above, with the following exceptions. First, a Horace Mann charter school must have its charter approved by the local school committee and the local teacher's union in addition to the Board of Education. Second, to the extent provided by their charters, Horace Mann charter schools may be exempt from certain provisions in local collective bargaining agreements. Third, employees of a Horace Mann charter school remain members of the local collective bargaining unit; continue to accrue seniority; and receive, at a minimum, the salary and benefits established by the local collective bargaining agreement.
